

A Shared Leadership Process for Ending Rural Homelessness *Key Takeaways - Public Health 2024*

Community-led Process

Listen intentionally to community with a willingness to be adaptable to the needs of the sector. Create space to pause and move forward in this work equitably and with intention. Be in a state of readiness for opportunities as they arise - we can respond without all the answers. Create a network of networks. Consider utilizing and adapting models that will support your ongoing work and process. One example is Collective Impact, as utilized by the Homeless No More Initiative. There are many resources available to support practice in Collective Impact and other models through organizations like the Tamarack Institute.

Engage & Act with Community Organizations

Listen to and act with community/sector organizations. Through hosted engagements with community and sector organizations, Homeless No More was able to listen and plan to:

- Amplify the work of the sector
- Connect services and resources
- Influence policy, funding, and systems change
- Support organizations in advocacy and data collection

Community-Support & Service Based Counts

Community Support and Service-based counts are currently best practices in capturing the enumerations of homelessness in rural areas.

Tips for Success:

- Build relationships with community partners by meeting them where they are at and identifying what kind of data would support them, their organization and the individuals they work with.
- Connect with a champion in the work who is connected to an academic institution. Ideally, a profession or academic-related to research.
- Invite the sector to collectively develop the questions and data they want to collect in the count.
- Allow the organizations to lead the process
